TZEDAKAH

Although we generally associate the mitzvah of tzedakah with giving money, the mitzvah encompasses all forms of kindness. Tzedakah can be as basic as offering someone a lift or shlepping a friend's heavy load. Tzedakah can also take forms that are more "spiritual" — cheering up a friend who is depressed, or sharing your knowledge or insights with another. Whatever form it takes, the Torah regards preserving the dignity and self-respect of the receiver as a cornerstone of tzedakah. Accordingly, the great codifier of Jewish law, Maimonides formulated a list of eight levels of giving, correlating to the degree to which the giver is sensitive to the needs and feelings of the recipient.

❖ Level Eight: Giving grudgingly, with a sour countenance.

- ❖ Level Seven: Giving less than you can afford, but doing so pleasantly.
- ❖ Level Six: Giving generously, but only after being asked.
- ❖ Level Five: Giving before you are asked.
- ❖ Level Four: The recipient knows the giver, but the giver does not know the recipient.
- ❖ Level Three: The giver knows the recipient, but the recipient does not know the giver.
- ❖ Level Two: Giving anonymously, where the recipient does not know the giver and vice versa.
- ❖ Level One: Helping someone become self-sufficient.

WITH OUR CONGREGATION



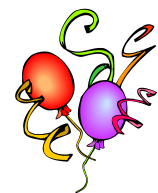

My Mother

I want to tell you about my mother, Margaret Kushner, who died in July, 1979, three months before my father's death.

My mom was an exceptional woman. She graduated from UNC Teacher's College, which became the University of NC in Greensboro, where she majored in English and minored in French and music. She was a life-long educator. She taught for many years at GW, and is still remembered by former students as an outstanding French and German teacher. I think it remarkable that at the age of 50 she returned to college to get her certification in German.

Mother taught us about the importance of education and always encouraged our interests. She made opportunities available to us to expand our minds and horizons. She taught us about the beauty of the garden, music, and art.

Mom was a mensch. She knew what was right and did right. She had special empathy for the elderly of our congregation and never forgot those in need. She taught us to do right though sometimes we have missed the mark. Perhaps we can keep mom's spirit alive by telling our grandchildren about her and the values for which she stood.

Mother was a righteous woman who devoted her life to good deeds. When she died, we asked that her funeral service be conducted at the Temple she so loved as an expression of our love and respect for her.

There are only few of you who remember my mother. I hope that her memory brings you a smile and the recollection of some kindness she showed you.

I was excited to participate in the recent virtual National Hadassah meeting. In addition to updates on all of Hadassah's good work through HMO, Youth Aliyah, Young Judaea, etc., Hadassah also promoted domestic advocacy and approved three new policy statements:

- Hadassah reaffirms and strongly encourages support for bilateral, cooperative, medical partnerships between the U.S. and Israel. Bipartisan legislation (S. 3722/H.R. 6829) is focused on improving the response to the COVID-19 pandemic through such medical partnerships.
- Hadassah supports investment in the American health care workforce; continued efforts to ensure adequate supplies of PPE, testing supplies, and medical resources; public education about the importance of vaccinations and the rapid production and distribution of a COVID-19 vaccine, once developed; and other policies to mitigate the health disparities highlighted by the pandemic.
- Hadassah celebrates the 100th anniversary of women gaining the right to vote by supporting efforts to ensure that each eligible person can vote safely and without impediment.

To review all of Hadassah's policy statements, including those from previous years on racial justice, sexual harassment, and anti-Semitism, go to the Hadassah website and 1) Click on Take Action; 2) Click on Action Center; 3) Click on Take Action/Advocate; 4) Scroll down to policy statements.

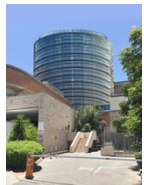
And just FYI, the Jabara-Heyer NO HATE Act (S. 2043/H.R. 3545) is bipartisan legislation to strengthen federal laws that combat hate speech, threats, and attacks.
