 God's Storehouse is again collaborating with Commonwealth Document Management to Shred Out Hunger in the Dan River Region. On Saturday, November 7, from 9 a.m. until noon, community members are invited to bring their personal documents to be shredded in exchange for donations of nonperishable canned goods at God's Storehouse, located at 750 Memorial Drive in Danville. Chanukah 5781/2020 The first candle is lit on December 10

Candles are added to the *hanukkiyah* (menorah) from right to left but are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first. (On the Shabbat of Hanukkah, kindle the Hanukkah lights first and then the Shabbat candles.) Light the *shamash* (the helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the Hanukkah lights. As you do, say or sing

בָּרוּך אַתָּה, יְיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ, מֶלֶרְ הָעוֹלָם, אֲשֶׁר קִדְּשֶׁנוּ בְּמִצְוֹתָיו וְצָוְנוּ לְהַדְלִיק נֵר שֶׁל חֲנֵכָּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu l'hadlik ner shel Hanukkah. Blessed are You, <u>Adonai our</u> God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with <u>mitzvot</u>, commanding us to kindle the Hanukkah lights.

בָּרוּך אַתָּה, יְיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ, מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, שֶׁעֶשָׂה נִסִּים לַאֲבוֹתֵינוּ וְאִמּוֹתֵינוּ בַּיָמִים הָהֵם בַּזְמַן הַזֶּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, she-asah nisim laavoteinu v'imoteinu bayamim hahaeim baz'man hazeh. Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wonderous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

FOR FIRST NIGHT ONLY:

Hadassah continues its focus on civic engagement as a way to celebrate 100 years of women's suffrage, and continues its commitment to ensure that each eligible person can vote safely and without impediments. Whatever the results of this election, we will continue our efforts at tikkun olam by advocating for a fairer and more just society.

The Virginia members of the Southern Seaboard Region, along with Virginia members of the Greater Washington DC Region, planned and implemented a Zoom webinar on September 23rd with Senator Tim Kaine. Senator Kaine shared his views on US – Israel collaboration, access to health care, and anti-Semitism, among others. The Senator's staff was most helpful in pulling this effort together and it was a tremendous success! Hopefully we can establish more webinars with our other senators (both in Virginia and in North Carolina) in 2021.

These are challenging times for many reasons and most of us need a break from our pandemic predicaments. Here's something that can reenergize you for civic engagement while learning and having fun too. Here's what to do:

- Go to #HadassahVotes in your browser and register with the Hadassah Voting Team to support Hadassah's participation in Vision2020Votes, a national nonpartisan effort to encourage women's participation in this year's election. You will be assigned to the Southern Seaboard Region.
- Once registered, there are many easy and quick actions that you can take to earn points for the Southern Seaboard Region. Examples are promoting #HadassahVotes on social media and checking out your BallotGuide.
- The Southern Seaboard is currently in 3rd place among all the regions in the country in number of participants and actions taken. With a few more points we can overtake the Southern Region, currently in 2nd place. Get your competitive juices flowing and let all of Hadassah know that the Southern Seaboard Region is small but mighty!

Your board members are currently working on our chapter's annual plan for 2021. If you have suggestions for virtual programs or other activities for the coming year, please contact one of us and let us know. An Oasis of Peace By Ellen Hershkin, Past National Hadassah President



To many, the term "Middle East peace" represents the impossible dream, if not the ultimate contradiction in terms. But there is a place in the region where Jews, Muslims and Christians meet peacefully every day on the basis of shared concerns and a sense of humanity.

It's not a country, though it is older than many of the nations in the vicinity. Nor is it a mirage, though the desert is within view.

It's the Hadassah Medical Center in Jerusalem... In the corridors, waiting areas, operating theaters, examination rooms, gardens and cafeterias of the center's two hospital campuses, doctors, nurses and technicians of different faiths and ethnicities work together. Patients and visiting families reflecting the same diversity rub shoulders, speak with sympathy, and often celebrate, pray or mourn side by side.

For Hadassah, The Women's Zionist Organization of America, Inc. (HWZOA), which founded the medical center in 1918, equal treatment for all is an expression of Jewish ethics. But it's not an exclusively Jewish value. "It's an oath between me and God, that I'm going to help anyone, with no bias, not race, gender or religion, just as a human," says Dr. Shaden Salameh, head of the emergency room at Hadassah's Mount Scopus hospital campus—the first Arab woman to hold such a position in Israel.

Peaceful coexistence is practical as well as moral. "Israel has a lot of tension and when you present a [medical] team that has people from all walks of life it calms things down," observes Dr. Hadar Merhav, director of the transplantation unit at the medical center's Ein Kerem hospital campus and a Jewish native of Jerusalem. Dr. Merhav routinely works with Dr. Abed Khalaileh, director of kidney transplantation and a Palestinian native of the city. Last year NBC News reported on a liver transplant the physicians performed together involving a Jewish donor and an Arab recipient.
