### **Our Torahs are Calling to Us**

February 2019 was the last time we opened the curtains of our ark, walked a Torah around the sanctuary, scrolled it to the weekly parshah, responded to the aliyah, listened to its words chanted in Hebrew and interpreted in English, and learned how those ancient words applied to us today. Won't it be wonderful when we can join together and enjoy that experience once again!

Our Torahs are calling to us, but in the meantime, we can still read the sacred words in our bibles or on line (chanting included). We can find interesting commentaries at urj.org or chabad.org, or write our own commentaries, even if they're only in our heads. A sentence or even just one or two words can often give us a starting point to think about how that week's parshah relates to us as individuals.

Our Torahs are calling to us to remind us that the celebration of Shavuot, Z'mon Maton Toratenu, the time of the giving of the Torah, will be here soon. Think about how you felt when you read from or held a Torah, or how you felt when you led a service and presented a D'var Torah. Think

about the meaning of Ruth F. Brin's poem on the next page. Think about our Temple Beth Sholom Torahs ...they are calling to us. "Our Torah is the great symbol of Jewish life today, as it has been for more than two thousand years.

At first there was the menorah, the Ark of the Covenant, and then the Temple.

But before the Second Temple was built, the reading of the Torah became the great symbolic act of Jewish unity.

Medieval Jews honored the Torah with a rich cover and a crown, as they had learned to honor royalty.

Modern Jews, like our ancestors, stand in its presence and treat it with awe, a holy object.

It is a Tree of life we say, therefore identifying it with the seven-branched menorah that stood in the tabernacle and the Temple.

It contains the Law of Moses, we say, identifying it with the Tablets of the Covenant given on Mount Sinai.

Torah is the life and the length of our days, we say, identifying it with the Temple, the center of Jewish life in the past, and proclaiming it the center of Jewish life today for ourselves and our people.

We stand in awe of these scrolls, for they have preserved us as we have preserved them. They are potent and they are dangerous:

Dangerous if we treat them like icons, keep the scrolls rolled and look at the jeweled embroidery, kiss the mantle and forget the words."

Dangerous even if we read the words and accept them as written... without understanding, without interpretation, without love.

Potent to make us seek eternal values in our temporary lives; potent to set our minds and souls on the search for God.

This is our Torah. In it is the God-seeking of our people. Let us use it with wisdom.



# Hadassah Announces Yom Yerushalayim Celebration Honoring the Reunification of Its Two Hospitals

May 3, 2021 – New York, NY – On Monday, May 10, Hadassah, The Women's Zionist Organization of America, Inc. (HWZOA), will hold a Yom Yerushalayim event, "Hadassah & Jerusalem: United Forever." The event will celebrate the reunification following the Six-Day War both of East and West Jerusalem and Hadassah's two hospitals, Hadassah Hospital Ein Kerem, which is in West Jerusalem, and Hadassah Hospital Mount Scopus, which is in East Jerusalem. Together, they formed the Hadassah Medical Organization (HMO). The virtual event will be broadcast on Monday, May 10, at 7:30 pm.

The celebration will be hosted by actress Tovah Feldshuh and will feature musical performances by the Israeli duo Yonina and the Jerusalem Symphony Orchestra. Jerusalem Mayor Moshe Leon, Hadassah Hospital Mount Scopus Director Dr. Tamar Elram and Hadassah National President Rhoda Smolow will be among the speakers. The event is edited, filmed and produced by Elad Schanin of CRC Media.

President Smolow: "Yom Yerushalayim is an extremely important holiday for Israelis and for Jews around the world and one that occupies a special place in the heart of the Hadassah community. Hadassah & Jerusalem: United Forever will be a chance to celebrate this historic anniversary for Israel, for Hadassah and for the inspiring teams at our two hospitals."

# Hadassah Schedules Mission to Argentina to Share Its COVID-19 Expertise (excerpts from the article)

May 4, 2021 - Hadassah International (HI), Hadassah, The Women's Zionist Organization of America (HWZOA), and Hadassah Medical Organization (HMO) have confirmed a joint collaboration between the Argentinean Government and HMO in Jerusalem, aimed at providing Argentina with the help it needs to prevent COVID-19 from spreading out of control. Five top medical experts from Hadassah Hospital Ein Kerem will travel to Argentina next week to share Hadassah's extensive experience with treating COVID-19. At the same time, conversations to start a phase III study of Brilife, the Israeli COVID-19 vaccine, which was developed by the Israel Institute for Biological Research and tested primarily at Hadassah, will be initiated in Argentina.

Rhoda Smolow, President of Hadassah, The Women's Zionist Organization of America (HWZOA) said: "Hadassah's medical care is not constrained by geographic boundaries. With COVID-19 spiraling out of control in Argentina and the country's healthcare system in crisis, Hadassah has a moral obligation to step in. We are extremely proud of the HMO delegation, an all-star team of leading doctors, specialists in COVID-19 and a nurse from the COVID-19 ICU, who have volunteered to travel across the world. They will provide critical expertise to Argentina as it struggles to manage the onslaught of COVID-19 cases and stave off the worst effects of this terrifying disease."

Mr. Diener concluded: "For Hadassah Medical Organization and Hadassah International, this collaboration represents the fulfillment of our most important mission, which is to build bridges among nations through health." He added," The realization of joint projects with Argentina, which may eventually ensure the health of the population of Argentina in these critical times, will not only have an impact in both our countries, but will also generate solutions that can be applied in other parts of the world."
