Chanukah 5782/2021 The first candle is lit on the evening of November 28th

Candles are added to the *hanukkiyah* (menorah) from right to left but are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first. (On the Shabbat of Chanukah, kindle the Chanukah lights first and then the Shabbat candles.) Light the *shamash* (the helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the Chanukah lights. As you do, say or sing

WHAT WE DID in SEPTEMBER and OCTOBER



September was filled with the fall holidays and again this year we had to Zoom or live-stream from home with various temples for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. However, we did have our own outdoor shofar service at the Fraifeld's home. We think Eddy outdid himself this year with his last blast! We were also able to meet for Tashlich at the river and used tiny twigs as a symbol to cast away our sins. (Bread crumbs are not a natural food source for fish, ducks or geese and we therefore honored their health and the posted signs.) Once again, a Yizkor booklet, containing the names of those being remembered along with readings and prayers, was put together and mailed to the participating congregants and family members.

We were able to have in-person Sukkot and Simchat Torah services. Our Sukkot/Shabbat service was held outdoors at First Presbyterian Church. We didn't have a sukkah but everyone was able to welcome Shabbat, participate in a Shabbat/Sukkot service, shake the lulav and the etrog, and enjoy being outdoors together. Simchat Torah was celebrated in the chapel at FPC and there was lots of singing as each person had a chance to carry the Torah up and down the aisle. It's always exciting to hear the last lines of Deuteronomy (Devarim) and the beginning of Genesis (Bereshit) knowing that the Torah cycle begins once again!

Shabbat is our weekly way of being together whether on Zoom or in-person. Thank you to all who participate and raise your voices in prayer and song. We should all be grateful to the congregation at First Presbyterian Church for allowing us to worship in their chapel. Our portable ark stands tall, our candlesticks shine on Shabbat, and our prayer books have their places in each pew. We are lucky to be partnered with a house of worship that feels "that's what neighbors do!"

If it's autumn, it must be Angels of Mercy time! The first campaign of this unusual fundraiser was in 1950, making this the 72nd year that members of the Danville Hadassah chapter have solicited local businesses and individuals to support the Hadassah Medical Organization in Israel, whose life-saving research and treatment modalities are shared throughout the world.

Why is this an "unusual" Hadassah fundraiser, and what accounts for its longevity? Most Hadassah chapters get the vast majority of their donations from Jewish individuals or Jewishowned businesses; in that sense, the Danville chapter is an outlier, as the majority of our contributions come from the larger community. So, why would Southside Virginia, with few Jews and little awareness of non-Christian religions, be so supportive of Angels of Mercy for such a long time?

The first reason is of course because of the amazing breakthroughs in treatment pioneered by the medical professionals who work in the Hadassah Medical Organization. Here are just a few highlights:

Developed a new treatment for lupus, one of the autoimmune diseases where the body's immune system attacks its own healthy cells

Created a Center for Cystic Fibrosis that is a world leader in the research and treatment of this lethal genetic disease

Eliminated the physical manifestations of Parkinson's Disease by implanting electrodes in the patient's brain

Conducted the first clinical trials of a new stem cell therapy for ALS with positive results in the management of this disease

Developed a new laser lens to treat glaucoma

Invented the fetal kinetocardiogram which enabled doctors to diagnose cardiac arrhythmias in a fetus

Secondly, the Hadassah Medical Organization, with its diverse staff and mission to serve all patients regardless of race, religion, ethnicity, or national origin, serves as an island of peace in that troubled region. HMO is a beacon of hope for the prospect of harmony and reconciliation in the Middle East.

And finally, people donate to Angels of Mercy because they are asked, and because they are educated about Hadassah's good work. 




Book Chat with Amanda Mossey

It is said of Hadassah founder Henrietta Szold that "Wherever she sat and led the discussion, there was the head of the table." Since becoming a member myself many years ago, I have been privileged to help contribute to Hadassah's efforts to raise money to help promote better health in Israel, including the Hadassah Hospitals that are open to anyone regardless of background. But what did I really know about Henrietta Szold? While doing some other reading I came across a recently published book by Dvora Hacohen titled To Repair A Broken World and decided to give it a read. I still have a few chapters left to go, but this book does a fantastic job telling Henrietta's story. It starts off with Henrietta's upbringing in Baltimore and her close relationships with her parents and sisters. Henrietta was particularly close to her sister Rachel and was someone she frequently turned to for advice in her many endeavors. Wanting to help the immigrant population in Baltimore, one of her first big undertakings was opening a night school in Baltimore. Proving herself more than capable, she moved on to work for the Jewish Publication Society, editing, translating, writing, and more. Seen as invaluable to JPS, the board wanted to give her more responsibility but because she was a woman she was relegated to the title of secretary and often not given credit for her substantial contributions. As Henrietta moved on to other jobs, similar working conditions followed her becoming a great source of frustration for Henrietta. This, coupled with numerous failed attempts at finding a male companion led to severe depression that stayed with her for the majority of her life.

Despite perpetual setbacks and disappointments, at age 49 Henrietta went on a life changing vacation to Palestine with her mother. Here Henrietta was able to observe the living conditions of the Yishuv (Jewish settlements in Palestine) and coming face to face with the poverty, lack of resources, and poor health conditions eventually led to the beginnings of Hadassah. Hacohen's book goes on to illustrate how Hadassah evolved from its beginnings despite numerous roadblocks including ongoing political problems in the area, the Palestinians not always being trusting of the American support Hadassah was trying to provide, the deteriorating health of Henrietta and her family members, and even problems that came from other Zionist organizations.

Despite having a few chapters left to go, thanks to a very thorough introduction at the beginning of the book I know that Henrietta Szold passed away at age 84. Despite never being married or having children of her own, she left behind a legacy greater than most people can even dream of. Thanks to her efforts nearly one million people are helped every year through services provided by Hadassah.
